Erlton and Surrounding Area Cemeteries. (https://www.calgary.ca/parks/cemeteries)

The City of Calgary operates several cemeteries in and close to our community. The Chinese Cemetery, Union Cemetery, Burnsland Cemetery and St. Mary's Cemetery are considered historically significant cultural landscapes that have played important part in the settlement and establishment of Calgary as a city.

St Mary's and the Pioneer Cemetery. - Calgary's Historic Catholic Resting Place.

In 1876, the Roman Catholic Mission established a cemetery at 2nd Street and 24th Avenue SW that was used until 1897 when the St. Mary's Cemetery was completed. The graves at 2nd St. and 24 Ave. were exhumed and moved to the new cemetery. The City of Calgary assumed management of St.Mary's cemetery in 1935 and has expanded it to the surrounding areas. The original northern portion of the cemetery is known as St. Mary's Pioneer Cemetery where many of Calgary's early Catholic pioneers and founders are resting.

Union Cemetery – 28th Avenue and Spiller Road SE

In 1884 The City of Calgary recognized the need for a Protestant cemetery as Non-Catholics were being buried in unsanctified lands. The Shagannapi Point cemetery was developed and used for a few years but it was not ideal because rocks and hard soil made digging the graves very challenging. The Union Cemetery was then established in 1890 as an alternate location for the Protestant cemetery. The graves at Shaganappi Point Cemetery were exhumed and moved to the Union Cemetery, many of Calgary's early Protestant pioneers and city founders are resting.

Burnsland Cemetery – 27th Avenue and Spiller Road SE

The Burnsland Cemetery was built next to the Union Cemetery because more burial sites were needed once the Union Cemetery was at capacity. The Burnsland Cemetery is where most of Calgary's World War 1 veterans are resting.

The Historic Chinese Cemetery – Erlton Street and Macleod Trail SW

The Chinese Cemetery was established in 1908 where many of Calgary's early Chinese Pioneers are resting.

Many of these people came to Calgary from Southern China over 100 yrs. ago and encountered very difficult times while they lived here. The immigration laws at that time prevented them from bringing family members to Canada so a lot of many of these people did not have any relatives or descendants in Calgary.

The Ciry began managing the cemetery in 1935 and includes burial sites, a pagoda with an oven for offerings to loved ones and a concrete and granite historical Chinese monument.
